COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTERS (CHCs) are non-profit or public comprehensive primary care providers with a mission to provide health care to low income working families.

Community Health Centers are the health care home for thousands of working families across Colorado.

- 15 CHCs operate 131 clinic sites in 34 Colorado counties and provided more than 1.8 million visits to more than 458,000 patients in 2010.
- 14 CHCs operate 43 dental clinic sites in 23 Colorado counties and provided more than 192,000 visits to more than 79,000 patients in 2010.
- Over 94% of patients served by CHCs have family incomes below 200% of the Federal Poverty Level (\$44,100 per year for a family of four in 2010).


Community Health Centers are a sound investment in Colorado communities.
