Clinical Quality Achievements at Community Health Centers Honored

In a red-carpet ceremony on March 11, 2010, the Colorado Community Health Network (CCHN) announced the winners of the 2010 Qualies. These awards recognize clinical quality achievement at Colorado's federally qualified Community Health Centers (CHCs). CHC teams from across the state were recognized for their work to meet high clinical quality standards for emergency preparedness, blood pressure control, improvements in screenings and follow-up services in women's health, and increased immunization rates for children.

"It is not accidental that national health reform proposals recognize the important role of federally qualified Community Health Centers and other community clinics in our efforts to improve and reform the health care service delivery system," said guest speaker Joan Henneberry, executive director of the Colorado Department of Health Care Policy and Financing (HCPF). "You are vital to our plans and progress in Colorado and essential in our desire to ensure access to quality, cost effective services for all Coloradans," she told the gathering.

The awards and winners:

- Masters of Disaster: Sunrise Community Health, Inc., for preparedness for emergencies.
- Hypertension Hero: High Plains Community Health Center, for the Heart Smart Navigation Program team with the best improvements in patient high blood pressure control.
- Pink Ribbon Award: Clinica Family Health Services, Inc., for increasing access to breast screenings and appropriate follow-up services.
- Best Shot Awards: Pediatric Health Center – Peak Vista Community Health Centers, Westwood Family Health Center – Denver Health's Community Health Services, Arvada Clinic – Metro Community Provider Network (MCPN), and Estes Street Community Clinic – MCPN, for increasing immunization rates.
- Women's Wellness Warrior: Pueblo Community Health Center, Inc., for improving access to timely, high-quality screening and diagnostic services to detect breast and cervical cancer at the earliest stages.

Community Health Center Advocates Visit State Capitol

In March, CCHN hosted its annual Policy and Issues (P&I) Forum. This event provides Colorado Health Center staff and board members an opportunity to learn about CCHN's top legislative priorities for the current session, and spend a day at the state capitol speaking with their elected officials about these priorities. The 2010 P&I drew more than 60 Health Center advocates, who met with 47 of the state's 65 legislators. The forum focused on the value of advocacy when working with legislators, the importance of state funding to Health Centers, and the positive impact passage of HB10-1138 would have on the recruitment and retention of primary care providers in Colorado.

At this year's P&I, CCHN recognized the Community Health Champions: Sen. Rollie Heath (SD-20); Rep. John Kefalas (HD-33); Dr. Thomas Gottlieb, volunteer clinician for MCPN; and Loretta Sword, reporter for the *The Pueblo Chieftain*. 

During the second day of the P&I, CHCs were honored by the Colorado General Assembly with the passage of a joint resolution recognizing the work of Colorado's CHCs in providing comprehensive primary health care for hundreds of thousands of people in Colorado. The bipartisan resolution was sponsored by Rep. Spencer Swalm (R-Centennial) and Sen. Rollie Heath (D-Boulder). Several senators and

representatives spoke on behalf of CHCs, and support was so strong that all members present in the House and the Senate at the time of the votes were added as cosponsors of the legislation.

Quality Improvement Leader Discusses “Medical Homes” with Colorado CHCs

Dr. Ed Wagner, from the MacColl Institute for Healthcare Innovation, gave an address at the Safety Net Medical Home Initiative (SNMHI) Colorado Regional Learning Session on April 20, 2010, in Lakewood, Colo. Dr. Wagner was a leader in the development of the Chronic Care Model that has been the cornerstone of quality improvement projects at CHCs for the last decade.

“The medical home model is not a fad. It is a rationale for better payment because it increases the expectations of primary care,” said Dr. Wagner to explain the rationale for demonstrating the medical home model at CHCs. “It isn’t ‘life support’ for primary care, but it invigorates and revitalizes primary care. There is no question that it is what patients want and need.”

Dr. Wagner provided an in-depth explanation of the eight “change concepts,” or pillars, of the SNMHI on which participating clinics will focus their quality improvement work over the next three years. The change concepts include engaged leadership, quality improvement strategy, empanelment, patient-centered interactions, organized and evidence-based care, continuous and team-based healing relationships, and enhanced access and care coordination.

The SNMHI is a joint effort of CCHN, The Colorado Health Foundation, and The Commonwealth Fund. Thirteen clinic sites, including three non-FQHCs, are participating in the SNMHI and have identified clinic-based practice transformation teams that design, implement, and measure changes to patient care as a

result of participation in the program. The Learning Session is an annual event that allows teams to share successes, “steal” ideas, and learn from experts in the field about the patient-centered medical home.

Several members of the Colorado congressional delegation were honored with NACHC awards for their support of CHCs and their patients. Rep. Diana DeGette received NACHC’s Distinguished Community Health Defender Award. NACHC’s Distinguished Community Health Superhero Award went to Reps. Jared Polis, Betsy Markey, Ed Perlmutter, John Salazar and Sens. Mark Udall and Michael Bennet.

Sunrise Dentist of 30 Years Departs



Sunrise Community Health, Inc., in Greeley, bid a sad and fond farewell to Dr. Kent Day, dentist, on May 14, 2010, where he cared for patients for 30 years. When Dr. Day took the job, he was working in a two-chair oral health facility then housed in a trailer next to the old Gill High School. He stayed, moving with Sunrise to two other sites over the years.

“It is certainly sad to see Kent go but we can do nothing but celebrate his time with us, the thousands of patients he touched, and his dedication to the Community Health Center mission,” said Mitzi Moran, president and CEO of Sunrise. “He has been an inspiration to many of us. We will miss him very much.”

Dr. Day moved to Germany to serve as a dentist for the U.S. Army, a contract that will last two to three years. He and his wife plan to return to northern Colorado.

Denver Health Van Simplifies Enrollment

Denver Health launched their new Health Access Express Enrollment Van on Feb. 11, 2010, at The Gathering Place. The van is designed to help eligible residents in Denver communities in publicly funded health programs, such as Medicaid and the Child Health Plan Plus (CHP+). Approximately 7,200 individuals are expected to benefit from this program over the next three years. The distinctive van, decorated with artwork donated by Tony Ortega, is equipped with three work stations for bilingual staff members to complete enrollment screenings. A small family-friendly waiting area includes a children’s play area.

Outreach enrollment sites include Denver Head Starts and child care centers, Denver Public Schools, Denver Housing Authority, churches, community-based organizations, agencies serving the homeless, businesses, big-box stores and many other locations. The schedule includes early morning, evening and weekend hours. The Health Access Express is supported by The Colorado Health Foundation. Pueblo’s Fieldman Honored

Janet Fieldman, chief foundation officer, Pueblo Community Health Center Foundation, was one of the five women chosen to receive the YWCA Anna Taussig Outstanding Achievement Award. This award is given every year to women who are role models for other women and girls, women who symbolize the YWCA’s mission of empowering women and eliminating racism.

“Since we all know Janet very well, we were not surprised that she was selected,” said Donald Moore, CEO of Pueblo Community Health Center, Inc. “But, it is wonderful that more of the community has had their eyes opened to the contributions Janet makes to Pueblo.”

A committee composed of out-of-town women reviewed the nominations to assure objectivity in the selection process. The awards were presented at the YWCA Tribute to Women held May 20, 2010, at the Pueblo Convention Center. Actress Shirley Jones gave the keynote speaker.

New Senior Health Center Opens in Colorado Springs

Care for Homeless Hits the Road in Colorado Springs

Peak Vista introduced its new "Bridging the Gaps" Homeless Medical Van at a gathering on Feb. 10, 2010, in Colorado Springs. The van provides care similar to that provided at Peak Vista's Homeless Health Center on West Rio Grande, but will make it possible for Peak Vista to reach more rural homeless individuals and families in El Paso County. The new mobile unit operates in partnership with El Paso County and Catholic Charities. It is expected to provide care to 500 patients annually.



Colorado CHC Leader Named HHS Regional Director

Marguerite Salazar, formerly president and CEO of Valley-Wide Health Systems, Inc., was appointed U.S. Health and Human Services (HHS) Regional Director. She oversees HHS activities in Region VIII, which includes Colorado, Montana, North Dakota, South Dakota, Utah, and Wyoming. She began her new responsibilities in May 2010.

POLICY UPDATE

State Legislative Session Ends, State Budget Primary Topic of Session

Colorado's 2010 legislative session ended on May 12. The primary focus of the session was the state budget, with legislators looking at revenue options, such as eliminating tax credits, and attempting to streamline current public programs. Due to the tight constraints on the state budget, legislators had to carefully consider the impact that all legislation would have on the budget. CCHN staff and lobbyists worked hard throughout the session to ensure that legislators were aware of the valuable role CHCs play in providing access to health care to all Coloradans and the impact that cuts to the state budget have on CHCs' abilities to provide this access.


Here are the highlights for Colorado CHCs:

HB10-1138, Colorado Health Service Corps: This legislation strengthens the state's student loan forgiveness program for health care providers practicing in underserved areas. This legislation renames the State Health Care Professional Loan Repayment Program as the Colorado Health Service Corps. The bill was signed by Gov. Ritter.

HB10-1033, Concerning the provision of services through Medicaid to treat substance abuse: This legislation would allow providers to bill Medicaid for Screening, Brief Intervention, and Referral to Treatment (SBIRT) for individuals at risk for substance abuse. Many CHCs already provide SBIRT services to patients, and the passage of this bill will allow CHCs to better capture the cost and be reimbursed for providing these services. The bill passed both the House and Senate and is awaiting Gov. Ritter's signature.

CHCs Receive Critical Workforce Help

Recently announced loan repayment awards from the Colorado Health Service Corps and from The Colorado Health Foundation (TCHF) Physician Loan Repayment Program are helping improve access to health care providers to people across Colorado. Published every two years, the resulting report of collected data is a valuable tool for evaluating salary and benefits structures for CHC employees, assessing workforce trends, and is a component for determining economic impact of CHCs.

All Region VIII community, migrant, and homeless Health Centers are encouraged to participate in this opportunity to provide a regional snapshot of salary and benefits structures and workforce trends across the mountain and plains states. The 2010 survey tool was e-mailed to CHC executive directors, finance directors, and human resources contacts on May 3 and responses are due back to CHAMPS by June 15, 2010. The report will be published in October 2010.

CCMCN UPDATE

Meaningful Use Webcast Scheduled

The Colorado Community Managed Care Network (CCMCN) / Colorado Associated Community Health Information Exchange (CACHIE) is a Colorado Regional Extension Center (CO-REC) partner subcontracting with [Colorado Regional Health Information Organization](#) (CORHIO). Regional Extension Centers (RECs) have been established and funded to support Eligible Professionals (EP)/Priority Primary Care Providers (PPCP) in becoming 'Meaningful Users.' CCMCN/CACHIE will support CHCs to achieve Meaningful Use (MU). To receive Meaningful Use incentive payments, an EP/PPCP must demonstrate Meaningful Use of a certified Electronic Health Record (EHR) in three areas: e-prescribing, electronic exchange of health information, and the ability to report on quality measures.

CCMCN is hosting a webcast on June 7, 2010, from 12:00-1:00 p.m. MDT to review Meaningful Use. The webcast will be conducted by Dr. Chris Tonozzi, chief medical information officer at Mountain Family Health Centers, with support from Heather Stocker, CCMCN director of clinical programming and development, who is leading the CCMCN/CACHIE Meaningful Use/REC Efforts.
